

Long Beach Veterans Memorial Stadium

America's International Speedway Stadium



he announcement by Harry Oxley that Long Beach Veterans Memorial Stadium will be the site of at least five major speedway events in 1984 has important ramifications, not only for speedway in this country, but for International Speedway in general. It will be the first world class ¼ mile speedway ficility to be developed and used in the United States on a regular basis.

"What we are looking for," Oxley said, "is to make Long Beach Veterans Memorial Stadium into an Olympic Speedway Stadium—a stadium for international events! It's the best hope for International Speedway in this country."

Oxley first utilized the stadium for a speedway race in 1981, needing a European sized and shaped track to qualify the riders for the World Final, the Veterans Memorial stadium was again used to host the American Speedway Final. It was the first time the Final had been run in Long Beach. The previous sites had been the Los Angeles Coliseum and Anaheim Stadium.


This year, both the American Speedway Final and the Mid-Summer Classic were held at the stadium. "Basically I was very unhappy with

the first year's track, because I didn't think it produced the quality of racing that we were looking for," Oxley said. "This year we came in and put more banking on the corners with the guarantee that we could run five events and it really improved the track. The fact is the Mid-Summer Classic with the handicap racing was some of the very best racing I've ever seen in my life."

Turning the stadium into a World Class speedway facility is an expensive proposition. "Last year we had close to 70 truck and trailer loads of dirt down just to put the lift in the corners," Oxley said, "and that doesn't count your top surface or anything else, so we need multiple events to make it economically feasible."

Five major speedway events are being held this year. They include the running of the "Coca-Cola Spring Classic" on March 10. The upcoming Scratch/Handicap program on May 19, the "Nissan American Speedway Final" on June 9, the "Coors Mid-Summer Classic" on July 14 and the final round of this year's qualifier for the National Championship on August 25.



The toughest single event in United States speedway motor-cycle racing is the "Nissan American Speedway Final", and it takes place on Saturday evening June 9 at the big 1/4-mile track at Long Beach Veterans Stadium.

For the top four riders, this will be a chance to participate in the World Individual Championship, to be held later this year in Ullevi, Sweden. For the fans, it will be a chance to watch and participate in the single most important speedway race of the year...The first step toward the 1984 World Championship.

It was just three years ago when Bruce Penhall, the 26-year-old California "Golden Boy", began his rise to the World Championship. He emerged from this very same American Speedway Final and Bruce agrees with promoter Harry Oxley when he says, "the Nissan American Speedway Final at Long Beach is the toughest event of the year for U.S. riders".

The best 16 American riders in the world will meet on this one all important night to determine who will fill the four spots allocated for the United States in the World Championship rounds. An engine break down, a broken chain, even a simple flat tire could mean disaster, because at this level of competition a racer cannot afford to lose any points to the opposition, and that means that the action will be nothing short of two wheeled combat and no one will give an inch to his opponents.

This is what it's all about...This is speedway at its best...There will be no backing off of the throttle at Long Beach. These riders live and work all year for this one opportunity and when it comes, they will do whatever it takes to be one of the chosen few. In many ways,



Final" is the toughest and most competitive race of the entire international series, and if a guy can't stand the heat he might as well get off the track.

Long Beach Veterans Stadium, the host track of the "Nissan American Speedway Final" is now being inspected and groomed for the 1985 World Team Cup Championship. That event has already been allocated to the United States, and the course that the racers will compete on during the "Nissan American Speedway Final is a racing surface that has evolved over three years of careful planning and construction in anticipation of future world class events.

The field of riders will feature such international standouts as Bobby Schwartz, John Cook, Shawn and brother Kelly Moran, Lance King, Rick Miller and the undisputed King of Long Beach, Dennis Sigalos. Joining them will be Southern California regulars, Mike Faria, Alan Christian, Dubb

Ferrell, Brad Oxley, Gene Woods, Sam Ermolenko, Muke Curoso, Buddy Robinson and Steve Lucero.

A number of outstanding Southern Californians have been competing regularly in the tough British League. In fact, last season's averages were topped by Dennis Sigalos with an average in excess of 11 points out of a possible 12! Shawn Moran, the current World Long Track Champion, Bobby Schwartz, Sam Ermolenko and Lance King are all in the top 10 British League averages.

If you have never seen speedway racing on a big, European sized ½-mile track, this is your chance. If you have attended races at Long Beach in the past, you certainly won't want to miss this one! Tickets for the event are on sale through Ticketron agencies in Southern California. They will also be available at Long Beach Veterans Stadium from 2:00 p.m. until race time on the day of the event. Adult tickets are \$10.00, children under 12 are \$5.00 and all seats are general admission.

To get to Long Beach Veterans Stadium take the 405 Freeway to the Lakewood exit and then turn North three blocks to Conant. Turn right, and Long Beach Veterans Stadium will be ½-block on your left. The Riders View


Without question, the "Nissan American Final" at long Beach on June 9 is the most important meeting of the 1984 speedway season, and from a rider's view, the most feared.


The track at Long Beach can only be described as scary!



These dates are set in concrete according to Oxley. Additionally, a sanction has been granted by the FIM for the 1985 World Team Cup, which will be run at Long Beach on August 10 next year, and applications have been sent in for the 1987 Individual World Championship. Both of these are slated for Long Beach, and naturally a lot of seats would have to be added to accomodate the crowd. The World Team Cup would require probably another 20,000 seats, to raise the existing capacity from 15,000 to 35,000; with the World Final needing seating for at least 40,000.

"But we think the stadium is worthy of that investment," Oxley says. "The Veterans memorial Stadium is a very versatile, flexible facility with a fantastic location, and it's easy to develop it into a world class speedway track. If there is an event held at Long Beach, you can bet it's going to be a beauty."

There seemes to be little question that Long Beach Veterans Memorial Stadium will become a major site in International Speedway competition.


