

# ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS...

#### SAYS DON CLARKE

Nine years ago, when the Sunday Mirror started its sponsorship of the World Championship competition, I clearly remember Sports Editor George Casey turning to me to say: "They can't talk their way to Wembley. They've got to fight for a place."

What applied then, most certainly applies today. In fact I would say that any rider with hopes of becoming a Word Finalist has an increasingly tougher task to perform.

Four weeks ago 101 British riders optimistically set out on the World Championship road with their eyes firmly fixed on cash and glory.

Now only thirty-two of the original 101 starters are left to battle out this week's two semi-finals.

Tonight you will have the opportunity of watching sixteen of these gladiators fight it out in an attempt to reach the World Final, at Gothenburg, Sweden, on September '23rd.

But before they can hope to get there they have three further tough obstacles to overcome.

From this week's semi-finals sixteen top scorers move on to the British Final (Wimbledon, June  $27 \, \text{th}$ ).

From Wimbedon, the ten top scorers travel on to Sheffield (July 14th) to link up with six Nordic finalists, and from Sheffield the top ten will have won c passport to Wembley (Septemer 3rd), where they will clash with Russian, Polish, Czech and German challengers.

Tough going, eh? But if it isn't an easy road to ride, it is certainly littered with gold just waiting to be picked up by riders who have nerve and courage.

Tonight's semi-finalists have a chance of collecting Sunday Mirror prize money of £30 to the winner, £15 to the second, £5 to the third — plus point money.

Once through to the British Final (at Wimbledon), and British-European Final (at Sheffield), the prize monies jump to £100 to the first, £50 to the second, £30 to the third, at each meeting.

Then at the Wembley European Final (September 3rd) the gold rush is really on.

In addition to point and start money, further Sunday Mirror cheques of £250 to the winner, £125 to the second, £75 to the third, and £25 to the fourth puls £20 to each British rider not placed in the first four, but who qualify for the Gothenburg World Final.

Sounds easy when you read it. But believe me, it won't be.

Any rider who hopes to be on the World Final scene will have to ride like the devil to get there.

And if on the way he can line his pockets with Sunday Mirror cheques, he'll certainly have earned them.

# WELCOME TO TED FLANAGHAN



Meet Ted Flanaghan, new speedway manager here at Dudley Wood whose aim to raise the Heathens to the summit of the British League. Not only is Cradley's capture from Oxford going to look after the team, he is going to be responsible for the track and speedway in general.

And from that aspect there are few men in speedway better qualified.

Ted started in speedway way back in 1932, when after a period of hanging round the pits at Sheffield he was given the job of cleaning the bikes and leathers for such stars as Squib Burton.

Sheffield closed and Ted moved to Belle Vue as mechanic, only to return to Owlerton just before the war. Hostilities saw him in the Army and even that did not curb his enthusiasm for the sport. He retained his interest by promoting speedway in Italy when such riders as Split Waterman first took to the track.

After the war Ted was back at Sheffield again, this time as team manager. Five years at Leicester followed before he joined Oxford in 1955 where he became co-promoter.

An expert on track grading, a genius with machines, and a tactful handler of men — that's Ted. We all wish him the best of luck and friendship in his new capacity.



# SPEEDWAY COMMENTARY

#### THE LINE-UP

BILL ANDREWS (*Poole*): A steeplechase jockey in his native country of New Zealand this Kiwi turned to a mechanised mount with great success and came to England to ride for Newcastle in 1962. He returned to the horses the following year but was back with the Diamonds in 1964 when he really came to the fore, helping Newcastle to the Provincial League championship. He was transferred to Poole last season where he continued his improvement and finished second to Ronnie Genz in the Pirates' averages. (32 points).

MARTIN ASHBY (Swindon): With Briggs and Broadbanks as team-mates the battle for recognition at Swindon is tough, but Ashby has made it. He became third heat leader for the Robins last year but his progress was hampered by a nasty fall. Still he finished the season with a highly respectable race average of 2.19. Given a clear run this year Ashby could make some of the bigger stars sit up. (34 points).

NIGEL BOOCOCK (Coventry): A native of Wakefield, Yorkshire, began his career with Bradford in 1954 and two years later qualified for his first World final as reserve. He missed out until his next reserve appearance in 1962, and it was the following year when he first qualified as a full finalist. He has not missed since. Last year he notched eight points at Wembley. Nigel joined Coventry in 1959 after spells with Birmingham and Ipswich and is now England's leading rider. Rode in last week's Alan Hunt Memorial trophy meeting with his left leg encased in plaster — result of an Archilles tendon injury. (41 points).

ERIC BOOCOCK (Halifax): Nigel's younger brother has been going great guns this year, fulfilling the Coventry star's faith in him, and was one of the top qualifiers for tonight. A protege of Reg Fearman Eric was with Middlesbrough and Long Eaton before joining Halifax last year when he was holder of the Silver Sash for several weeks. Eric has the determination to get to the top. He isn't quite there yet, but he's well on the way. (42 points).

ERIC BOOTHROYD (Halifax): I called Eric a veteran in a recent write-up and he objected to that description, so let's just say he's one of the most experienced of tonight's semi-finalists. Well-known to Cradley fans for it was here that Eric started his career 16 years ago, and was soon snapped up by Birmingham. Since then there have been several mentions of packing up, but Eric still carries on, and still rakes in the points despite Mrs. Boothroyd's retirement talk. Now combining his riding interest with those of promoter at Middlesbrough. (34 points).

MIKE BROADBANKS (Swindon): Started at Rye House in 1952 but did not take to speedway seriously until three years later when he won the Southern Area league riders' championship and was offered a contract with Wembley. He moved to the Robins in 1957. He made his world final debut the following year and was also a finalist in 1961, 1962 and 1964. He was reserve last year. Winner of the Australian title in 1962, he is known as the Red Devil because of his red leathers. (37 points).

TREVOR HEDGE (Wimbledon): Undoubtedly one of the discoveries of the 1965 season, Trevor really shot to the top with the Dons. A rider with the stamp of a future champion proved the best of the English contingent in the Internationale two weeks ago when he finished fourth. A most exciting rider to watch Trevor must be one of the favourites to go at least a stage further from tonight. (34 points).

NORMAN HUNTER (West Ham): A product of the Provincial League Norman moved to the Hammers, then in the National League, two years ago. In his first year of speedway in 1962 Norman reached the provincial riders' championship and gained international honours. He has kept up the promise he showed in those early days and was one of the main reasons West Ham took the British League title and the knock-out cup last year. (37 points).

REG LUCKHURST (Wimbledon): Made his world final debut last year when he scored five points. Graduating to speedway from the grass track, Reg began at New Cross. He was loaned to Edinburgh, later moved to Swindon and then to Southampton before returning to London to ride for West Ham in 1964. Last year he was transferred to Wimbledon and quickly established himself there as a heat leader, finishing second in the averages to Olle Nygren. (32 points).

CYRIL MAIDMENT (Belle Vue): Gained his early practice at Rye House before joining Wimbledon in 1952. He was loaned to Wolverhampton and St. Austell before he eventually joined Belle Vue and found stardom. Twice Cyril has reached the world final, and both times it was staged in Sweden. The backbone of the Aces he had a splendid 2.42 race average last year. A tenacious rider, he must have a good chance of carrying that Ace of Clubs to the next stage. (34 points).

KEN McKINLEY (West Ham): Started with Glasgow in 1949 when he was his first visit to Dudley Wood. Moved to Leicester in 1954 and on to Coventry in 1962. He was transferred to the Hammers last year. Christened John Robert Vicars McKinley, he rode in his first world final in 1956. He missed in 1959 and 1963 but has otherwise been an ever-present. He was third in the British final last year but disappointed at Wembley when he gained only four points. He will be out to make amends this time. (36 points).

GEOFF MUDGE (Poole): Began his career with the Pirates in 1960 and played a great part in their successes in the Provincial League. He took over the captaincy when Ken Middleditch retired. This red-haired Australian is a fine team man, and a rider who can always be depended upon to give his best. A nasty accident in his home country in the 1964/5 close season, was followed by another soon after he came back, but Geoff shook them off to give another sound season's performance. (31 points).

BOB PAULSON (Sheffield): This is the lad who has been making them all sit up and take notice this year. Two years ago Bob was a raw novice, struggling for second half rides, but Frank Varey kept him on the hook. Last year he forced his way into the Tigers' team as reserve, and this season he has taken several steps up the ladder to become Sheffield's most consistent scorer. He has already gained international honours, and I have a feeling there is a lot more in store for this youngster. (33 points).

COLIN PRATT (Hackney): London born, Colin got his first chance with Stoke in 1961 and developed into one of the most stylish riders produced by the Provincial League. He was Midland provincial champion in 1963 but the next year saw him with Hackney where he took over as skipper. A mid-season loss of form last year robbed him of top spot in the Hawks' averages, but he was still only 0.01 behind Gerald Jackson. (34 points).

RAY WILSON (Long Eaton): Son of Long Eaton promoter Ron Wilson, Ray was a real track tearaway when he started a couple of years ago. He took knocks and still came up for more until a broken leg steadied him down. Now Ray still has the fire, but he also has a lot of skill and control, and the determination that makes a top class rider. He has beaten the best this year and looks like having his finest season of his young, but brilliant, career. (37 points).

DAVE YOUNGHUSBAND (Halifax): Third of the Halifax representative in tonight's line-up, Dave is a stylish rider who first had his chance with Middlesbrough. He moved to Halifax when Reg Fearman opened up last year and played a big part in taking the Dukes to fifth position in the final league table. His personal contribution to the points list was a total of 309 for an average of 2.26 a race and second place in the list to Eric Boocock. (31 points).

RONNIE GENZ (Poole reserve): Joined Poole at the start of last season, he was previously skipper of Oxford. His career began with New Cross and took him via Wolverhampton and Yarmouth to Oxford in 1954. He reached the British final last year but had a disappointing night. Top scorer for the Pirates last season on a race average of 2.39. (30 points).

JOHN DEWS (Sheffield reserve): A reliable second string who would be an asset to any side, without hitting the highspots. Has ridden for Cradley this season as a guest and as expected, played his part without setting the track alight. His 34 matches with the Tigers last season brought him a total of 215 points for an average of 1.54 a race. (30 points).

Due to such early enquiries being received the Supporters' Office will be accepting reservations for Wembley tickets and transport from Thursday, 16th June, at the Holly Bush Hotel. 


