NOW FOR THE GOLD RUSH

Nine years ago, when the "Sunday Mirror" started its sponsorship of the World Championship competition, I remember Sports Editor George Casey saying to me: "Nobody will be able to talk their way to the final. They've got to fight for a place."

Just over a month ago .101 British riders tightened their belts and started to battle through the nineteen qualifying and two semi-final rounds of the 1966 World Championship competition.

Tonight, sixteen men who have survived these gruelling rounds, go out to battle for further World Championship honours.

To qualify for tonight's British Final is an achievement in itself.

But if any of these sixteen contestants consider they have already had a tough ride, they should think again. The trail to Wembley narrows at every stage.

From tonight's British Final only the top eight points scorers travel to Sheffield (July 14) where they will link up with eight Nordic riders in the British European Final. Looking at the Nordic challengers, British riders will not find the going easy. Consider the opposition.

Men like Norway's Sverre Harrfeldt, Per Aulie, Nils Paulson, Johnny Faarfeng: Denmark's Ole Olsen, Uoal Wissing; Finland's Matti Olin and Kalevi Lahtinen will be out to stop the ambitions of the British riders.

From the Sheffield British-European Final only eight go forward to the Wembley European Final (September 3) where Russian, Czech, Polish and German challengers

join in the fray.

It's not an easy road, but it's littered with gold waiting to be picked up by riders

who have nerve and courage.

In tonight's British Final there is Sunday Mirror prize money of £100 for the winner, £50 for the second and £30 for the third to be won. The same prize-money will be at stake in the British-European Final.

At the Wembley European Final the gold rush is really on. The Sunday Mirror will pay £250 to the winner, £125 to the second, £75 to the third, and £25 to the fourth.

In addition, each British rider not placed in the first four, but who qualify for

the Gothenburg World Final (September 23), will collec £20.

Sounds easy, but believe me, it won't be.

Any rider who hopes to be on the World Final scene will have to ride like the devil to get there.

If on the way he can line his pockets with Sunday Mirror cheques, he'll certainly

have earned them.





SPEEDWAY REGULATIONS GOVERNING THIS MEETING

Control of Racing—The Referee appointed by the Speedway Control Board of the Auto-Cycle Union is in sole control of the carrying out of a meeting according to the Regulations.

No Public Betting is allowed at any Speedway Meeting.

The F.I.M. (Federation Internationale Motorcycliste) is the world controlling authority for all International motor-cycle racing. Headquarters are in Geneva.

Starting—Clutch starting is compulsory for all official events. The riders move towards the tapes stopping at the two yard line. On the Referee switching on a green light in front and behind the riders, the Starting Marshall drops his arms and they move up to the tapes. When all four riders are stationary at tapes the back gate is pulled down, thus forming a starting box. The lifting of the gates is the starting signal. Gate is operated by the Referee. If a rider experiences trouble before the green light is displayed he may secure outside assistance, but if he is not ready to start within two minutes he is excluded.

The sounding of the Electric Hooter is the signal that the two minute period has commenced.

If a riders engine stalls at the start, he can be pushed for thirty yards in order to re-start his engine and keep in the race.

If a rider falls and receives outside assistance either to himself or machine, he s automatically disqualified.

The finishing line is indicated by a Neon Sign. the first rider's wheel to touch the line is the winner.

Speedway machines have no brakes.

All riders must wear leather riding suits, approved crash-helmets, gloves, and non-splinterable goggles whilst riding.

Signals to riders are as follows: Red light—Danger, stop racing. Yellow flag with black diagonal cross—One more lap to go. Black & white check flag—Race finished. Black flag shown to a rider together with his own colour flag—Withdraw from course. All races must start with four riders. A reserve is substituted for any rider unable to compete. A reserve cannot substitute once a race has been started and stopped by the Referee in the interest of safety.

Machines must not have an engine exceeding 500 cc.

A Rider is considered to have retired from the race if he has not completed the four laps within three minutes, or if he has not commenced the last lap before the winner has finished.


