

SPEEDWAY COMMENTARY

World championship time is here again and tonight 16 riders are in the Dudley Wood melting pot with their sights set on one of the 32 places in the semi-finals which are being staged here

and at Halifax around the middle of next month.

TAKE YOUR PICK

Who will head the chart tonight? Your guess is as good as mine, although there must be a sneaking regard for one of the home riders if he can avoid trouble.

Leading the Heathens' contingent is of course the skipper, IVOR BROWN. Undoubtedly Ivor will be keen to make amends for last week's disappointment when ignition trouble reduced him to two points. It made for a thrilling finish, but it was touch and go. However Ivor has less machine trouble than most riders thanks to mechanic Les Widdowson, and tonight could be his night.

Or it could be yet another success for the Welsh plumber IVOR HUGHES, who had his best meeting ever in Cradley colours against Swindon. It was a fine performance by Ivor who only gained a regular place in the team a few weeks ago. Here's a lad who has the determination and confidence to go a long way, and he made a great start to the campaign with 11 points at Long Eaton on Tuesday.

CLIVE FEATHERBY also had a better meeting against Swindon. He has still to show the same hard-riding ability he used to display here when he was with Sheffield. But once he does strike form the opposition can look out.

Another still struggling to hit true form is CHUM TAYLOR, whose progress has been hampered by more than a fair share of machine trouble. Right now Chum needs a confidence booster, and what better tonic would there be than to get into the double figure bracket in a world championship qualifying round?

Guest of honour is our old pal JOHNNY HART, making his first appearance at Dudley Wood since he moved to Sheffield at the start of the season. I can't imagine that he has forgotten his way around the Cradley circuit in two months.

Another familiar face from Sheffield is BOB PAULSON, the youngster who has shaken the speedway world with his successes this year. Even when Bob was riding here in second half events a couple of seasons ago Frank Varey was keeping him under his wing. His chance came towards the end of last season when injuries made a place for him in the Sheffield side. Now he's one of their leading scorers.

From Wolverhampton comes PETER VANDENBERG, now settled in nicely at Monmore Green. Maybe you recall the first visit of the Flying Dutchman to Dudley Wood three or four years ago when he was a National League junior. Peter cleaned up in that championship round by heading the points chart. Can he give repetition?

Hackney's ROY TRIGG must be a danger. The fact that he has ridden in Cradley colours this season — he guested for the Heathens at Poole — will not stop him doing his best to lower those colours tonight, and Roy certainly has the ability.

COLIN GOODDY of Exeter is a rider wha has livened things up at Dudley Wood in the past. He was the Falcons main stay last year with a fine race average of 2.30 and he is certain to be challenging for the top spot tonight.

Former Wolves' man MAURIE MATTINGLY has also done well here in seasons past. Remember the tussles he had with Ivor Brown? He basn't been making such an impact in the last two years, but Maurie is still a wily rider.

THE ROAD TO GOLD AND GLORY

What is it about World Championship racing that brings an extra keen glitter into the eyes of every rider, and a sense of excited anticipation into the

heart of the most blase speedway supporter?

The answer is quite simpe. It is the knowledge that with courage and skill it is within the bounds of any rider to reach the dizzy heights which could result in his stepping on to the winner's dias to be acclaimed WORLD CHAMPION.

Tonight you will see sixteen British riders start their trek towards World Championship gold and glory.

The reward will be hard earned. Make no mistakes about that.
From the 20 preliminary rounds now being staged on British tracks, only
32 riders from the original one hundred starters can go forward to the two
British semi-finals at Cradley Heath (June 13) and at Halifax (June 15).

Even when over these hurdles there are still two tough finals to be faced—the British Final (at Wimbledon on June 27), and British-European Final (at Sheffield on July 4), before the European Final is staged at Wembley Stadium, on

Saturday, September 3.

And at Wembley the chips will really be down before it is decided which

ten riders will go forward to the World Final, in Gothenburg, on September 23. It is a tough road to ride. Tonight's sixteen competitors know that there can be no quarter given if they hope to walk out to battle as one of the sixteen European Finalists at Wembley.

As well as glory, there are plenty of Sunday Mirror cash incentives to urge

riders to greater efforts in these battles.

Winner at each preliminary round will receive a Sunday Mirror cheque for £20, as well as his points money.

In the semi-finals Sunday Mirror prize money of £30 to the winner, £15 to the second and £5 to the third, can be won. Then the stakes get higher.

In both the British Final (at Wimbledon) and British-European-Final (at

Sheffield) prize money jumps to £100 to the top scorer, £50 to the second and £30 to the third.

The bonanza comes with the European Final at Wembley. In addition to point and start money, further Sunday Mirror cheques of £250 go to the winner, £125 to the second, £75 to the third, £25 to the fourth, plus £20 to each British rider not placed in the first four, who qualified for the World Final.

When this cash has been safely tucked into the bank, successful Finalists then have the Gothenburg World Final cash to look forward to.

Well, that's it; That is the glittering prospect within the reach of every

rider tonight.

You may rest assured that not one of them will let this chance of gold and alory slip lightly from his grasp.

SPEEDWAY COMMENTARY - continued

Accompanying Trigg from Hackney are the experienced GERRY JACKSON and young MALCOLM BROWN. Jackson joined the Wick from Wimbledon last year and in 30 matches he totalled 261 points at a race average of 2.16, bettering that of Hackney skipper Colin Pratt.

Malcolm Brown is one of the up and coming lads. I saw him in action at Wolverhampton last week when he played no small part in defeating Wolves. We shall be hearing more of Malcolm.

Two from Newcastle, GRAHAM COOMBES and RUSSS DENT, and one representatives from Long Eaton, DENNIS NEWTON, and Oxford, MAURY McDERMOTT, complete the field. Perhaps they are not among the favourites, but anything can happen in championship meetings. A fall, an engine failure, can spoil a riders chances, and often those who are listed as outsiders can pick up point when they are most unexpected.

May the best man win.


